- 1. Make use of Career Services (2100 Meisler Hall, (251) 460-6188) (not a placement service)
  - a. Consider career options before you graduate
    - i. How can you apply your degree?
    - ii. What career skills are needed?
    - iii. What are +/- of different positions?
  - b. Assistance with resumes
    - i. Tailor to position
    - ii. Highlight features
  - c. Interview preparation and mock interviews
  - d. Career and Graduate School Expos
  - e. Register with Career Services
- 2. Gain Experience (experiential learning is key)
  - a. UCUR, class, other research opportunities
  - b. Co-ops
  - c. Internships (clinical, corporate, industry, government)
  - d. Volunteer
  - e. Shadowing
  - f. Toastmasters
  - g. Seminars
  - h. Student-Instructor, tutoring
  - i. Study abroad
    - i. Second language
- 3. Learn to communicate effectively practice (class, student newspaper, meetings)
  - a. Oral
- i. Be aware of repeat words you use (so, like, um)
- b. Written
- 4. Be creative
  - a. Think outside the box
    - i. Outside your discipline
      - 1. Applications of your discipline
  - b. Use your problem solving skills (and be prepared to discuss these)
  - c. Use your critical thinking skills
- 5. Network
  - a. Faculty/Mentor links
  - b. Alumni
  - c. Members of professional associations related to field
  - d. Members of campus organizations related to field
  - e. Friends and family
  - f. Meetings

- 6. Do your homework before an interview
  - a. Learn about the company (remember corporations do business to make money how do you fit)
    - i. Consider how you can prove your value
    - ii. Consider room for advancement
  - b. Prepare questions
  - c. Professionalism
    - i. Integrity
    - ii. Ethics
    - iii. Responsibility
    - iv. Appearance

## **REMINDERS:**

- 1. Ask for help (mentors, career services, associates)
- 2. Your first job does not have to be your only job (think 2-5 yr plan) but try not to jump around too much (you will have to address this in interviews)
- 3. Be prepared to address gaps in your career
- 4. Be professional (don't be late, miss meetings, accept responsibility, follow directions)
