Introduction

The mission of this case study is to elevate the nation's first network that aims to create pathways to ensure and support adult learners of color receiving valuable credentials at Historically Black Community Colleges and Predominantly Black Community Colleges. Since their founding, these eight institutions have produced many of our nation's most outstanding professionals spanning across various workforce fields. Similar to their four-year university counterparts, HBCCs/PBCCs have historically been underfunded and under resourced.

Unlike their counterparts though, there is not a national network that advocates and supports HBCCs/PBCCs. Despite this, these schools continue to serve as academic pillars in their communities for people of all backgrounds to come and learn. These institutions have persevered through much adversity at both state and federal levels, which is why we must continue to advocate for and support them. The biggest posing question regarding HBCCs/PBCCs is if they adequately prepare individuals for the real world, and that answer is they certainly do! According to NCES, in the 2020-21 academic year, Black students received 43% of the 5,000 conferred associate degrees. This means that Black students are choosing community colleges which provide more options for entering into the workforce, than going the traditional route and taking the "normal time" of four years to complete a bachelor's degree.

Alabama Possible, in partnership with Complete College America and financial support from Lumina Foundation, Annie E. Casey Foundation, and ECMC Foundation, is committed to working with Alabama's eight HBCCs/PBCCs and providing them resources, so they can increase postsecondary transition and persistence as a strategy to remove barriers to prosperity.

This case study will highlight the strengths and challenges in the HBCCs/PBCCs and provide institutions with an in-depth look at tools to support their enrollment/transition rates, learning communities, retention rates, and graduate transitions/reverse transfer rates. These focus areas will be encompassed within a conceptual framework of intervention, prevention, and support strategies to fulfill our project's goal to increase postsecondary transition and persistence at the eight HBCCs/PBCCs as an approach towards removing barriers to prosperity. The research will also include nationwide best practices and incorporate them in the case study that will be published and disseminated among the eight institutions, so they may make informed decisions for their campuses, and will be distributed nationally as a resource for other institutions.






Student Race/Ethnicity

This is the percentage of first-time students who return to the institution in the fall to continue their studies. Students who started school in 2020 and returned in 2021:




Graduation

Students who started school in the Fall of 2018:

- There's a 28% overall graduation rate and a 27% transfer-out rate of full-time students who graduated/transferred within a "normal time" of their program's completion.
- At this institution, 33% of entering students were counted as "full-time, first-time" in 2021.

By Gender:

- While 36% of males graduate, only 19% of graduates are female.
- If we can identify the barriers that prevent female students from graduating, the network can help provide resources to fill in the gaps resulting in an increased graduation rate. When we analyze graduation rates by race, the disparities increase even more.






Student Race/Ethnicity

First-to-Second Year Retention Rates for First-Time Students



Chattahoochee has a wide range of both degree and training programs to choose from for students of all backgrounds.





Student Race/Ethnicity









Student Race/Ethnicity





Trenholm meets this demand by forging partnerships with four-year institutions, instilling new career and technical training programs, and ensuring our students have plenty of opportunities to succeed.













Many benefits of attending a community college include but aren't limited to, cost-effectiveness, class sizes, flexibility, and communal support.













FAQ's

1 As an HBCC, what is the greatest threat to HBCCs on the state and national levels?

The greatest threat would likely be a lack of financial support and not enough advocacy and lawmaking on the state and federal legislative levels.

2 How is Lawson ensuring that the curriculum is challenging and still prepares students for their next steps?

Lawson is doing this by developing a student-centered instructional program that is focused on heightened engagement, innovative technologies, and varied modes of delivery.

3 How is Lawson preparing the students on their current academic paths for successful academic and career transitions?

Lawson's top performers come from all of their degree and training programs, which is why they ensure that their students receive adequate resources such as tutoring, schedule flexibility, and career counseling to ensure the students' success.

4 Why is there a lack of exposure concerning HBCCs/PBCCs?






Student Race/Ethnicity





1 How is Shelton meeting the demand for people to complete workforce development and trade courses?

Shelton has a unique variety of both, and they meet the demand by properly preparing their students in all endeavors to not only start the courses but complete and graduate as well.




