- Good photographs show:
 - 1) How bad it is (extent of injury)
 - 2) How good we did (interventions)
 - 3) Tissue/patient response over time
- Our USA Health HIPPA Policy status that “authorization must be obtained for photographing, interviewing or video recording made for purposes other than the identification, treatment of the patient, or education.”
- Thus, images are for identification, treatment, and education.
- Consent always includes photography.

Tips:

Positioning	Background and Lighting	Images with Ipad	Smart Phone Apps	USA Email
<p>Include anatomic landmarks that clearly show the location</p> <p>Position camera to see the tissue characteristics</p> <p>The surface photographed should be at right angles to the camera line of sight</p>	<p>Blue background works the best</p> <p>Avoid patient identifiers and faces when not part of pathology</p> <p>Avoid staff members</p> <p>Avoid bright lights</p>	<p>Nurses use Ipad with Cerner App in BICU</p> <p>Photos of each burned area after wound care</p> <p>Notify burn provider if images get uploaded wrong</p>	<p>Cerner preferred by HIPPA Compliance Officers and has best resolution</p> <p>OneDrive App sends images one's personal microsoft 365</p> <p>Vincari app uploads directly to Vincari. Image resolution is marginal.</p>	<p>USA email is encrypted and is optimal for transmission of photographs.</p> <p>Delete email photos after transmission to EMR.</p>
