Biographical Note:

Jonathan Bryan May, Jr. was born in Greensboro, Alabama on February 8, 1939 to Jonathan Bryan May and Annie Lee Turberville. May grew up in Sawyerville near Umbria Plantation. His mother was close friends with the last Pickens to own Umbria, Eloise Pickens Lunsford. After receiving his Master's in Library Science from Columbia University May began working in their library. He worked for Columbia in the Journalism Library then as Government Documents Librarian, for twenty-seven years before retiring to take care of his family home. He also worked part time as a postal clerk for ten years.

Scope and Content:

This collection contains digital photographs, genealogical information, published and unpublished works by May, and an oral history interview May recorded with Prof. Michael Fitzgerald in 2019.

Among the photographs are 52 color images taken in 1971 of the Umbria Plantation shortly before it burned to the ground. There are also 42 black and white images from the Historic Architectural Building Survey taken in 1935 for the Works Projects Administration. There is a handwritten summary of May's memories of Umbria and his mother's friendship with Eloise Pickens Lunsford. The 2023 accrual [923 MB] includes images of the ruins of Umbria taken in 1999 and numerous May family photographs in addition to copies of 2 published works, and an unpublished autobiography titled, "Telling Stories: Essays at Autobiography."

- The rise and fall and possible rise again of a small Black Belt community.
- The tale of a young boy growing up gay in a rural conservative Southern community.
- His subsequent life, loves, and growing old gay.
- Gay history.
- The white May family's discovery and acceptance of their Black cousins.
- Race relations in the rural South 1940s to 2020s.
- Birmingham-Southern College 1957-1961.
- New York City during the period I lived there.
- 1968 riot and revolution at Columbia University.
- History of Greensboro Alabama.
- History of the May family of Hollow Square and Sawyerville.
- History of the Turberville family of Greensboro.
- Impact of deafness on a family.
- The AIDS crisis in New York and at Columbia.
- Big university librarianship 1960s-1980s.
- Family life in the South in the 1900s.
